Basketball SHARS coach young teens



Bono - a living legend

Bono is a very famous Irish singer. He is the lead singer of the rock band U2. His real name isn't Bono. It's Paul David Hewson. Bono is his nickname. It's an abbreviation of *Bona Vox*. That means "good voice" in Latin.

Bono was born on May 10th, 1960, in Dublin, Ireland.
When he was a teenager, he was a student at Mount
Temple Comprehensive School. The other members
of the band – the drummer Larry Mullen and the
guitarists David Evans (The Edge) and Adam
Clayton – were students there, too. At first the name
of their band was Feedback, then The Hype, and finally U2.

Bono writes the lyrics for U2's songs. They often have social and political themes. The band's first international hit song was in 1980. Its title was "I Will Follow" and it was popular in Ireland, the U.K. and the U.S. By the mid-1980s, U2 was famous all over the world and Bono was a superstar.

In 1985, Bono and U2 were part of a special project to help poor people in Africa and they were performers at a famous charity concert called Live Aid. Today, Bono does a lot of work to help poor people around the world and is a supporter of the human rights organization, Amnesty International.




A history of popular music

Bock 'n' roll was born in the U.S. in the 1950s. It was a mix of blues and country music. Elvis Presley was the first rock 'n' roll superstar. Soon rock 'n' roll was popular in other countries. A British band. The Beatles, was world famous in the 1960s. Their music was very influential on modern pop and rock.

In the 1970s, rock music, with bands like Pink Floyd and Led Zeppelin, was very popular. For some people these groups were too serious, and so glam rock (short for "glamorous") was born. David Bowie and Elton John were its leaders. Elton John was famous for his incredible clothes and crazy glasses.

The Clash, and The Ramones were important punk bands. The 1980s was the period of stadium rock. Its superstars were Bruce Springsteen, Queen, and U2. Their concerts were in enormous stadiums. In 1981 there were 130,000 people at the Queen concert in the Maracanã Stadium in Rio de Janeiro! Hip-hop is a popular music style today. Beyoncé and Jay-Z are popular hip-hop superstars.

Christopher Columbus


Christopher Columbus was born in Genoa, Italy, in 1451. He was a sailor and an explorer, and his ambition was to travel west to Asia. In the 15th century Asia was important for commerce and a lot of sailors went there. They always sailed east and their journey was long and dangerous. Columbus believed that the world was round and that the short route to Asia was west.

In 1492 King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain gave Columbus money for his journey. Three ships, the *Niña*, the *Pinta*, and the *Santa Maria*, left Spain on August 3rd, 1492. The journey was very

long, but after two months, they arrived on an island in the Caribbean. Columbus and his sailors called the island San Salvador (Holy Savior). Columbus thought he was in India and that the people on the island were Indians. He returned to Spain a hero and he brought gold, animals, and new plants to Europe.

Columbus's journey was important because he discovered the New World – the world of the Americas. Today, the U.S. has a holiday on October 12th to celebrate Christopher Columbus's first journey to the New World. It's called *Columbus Day*.

It all started with a mouse!

Today, the Walt Disney Company is very big. It has movie studios, TV channels, movie theaters, and theme parks. But in the 1920s it was very small. That

changed when Walt Disney created a little cartoon mouse. He called the mouse Mortimer, but his wife, Lillian, didn't like the name and she suggested Mickey.

Mickey appeared in the cartoon, *Plane Crazy*, in 1928. People liked the movie, but the Hollywood movie studios didn't want to buy it because it was a silent movie and the characters didn't talk in it. Soon Mickey started to talk in his cartoons and he became a star. At first,

Volcanoes

What is a volcano?

1 Volcanoes look like mountains, but they are actually openings in the Earth's surface, or crust. Volcanoes can be different shapes, but inside they are all the same.


Where do you find volcanoes?

The Earth's crust is very thin and consists of large, thin pieces of rock called tectonic plates. The Earth has sixteen main plates. Volcanoes are often near the places where the plates meet. The plates lie on a softer, hotter layer called the mantle and they are constantly moving. Sometimes one plate goes under another and the plate

- 10 melts and forms a hot liquid called magma. Because the plates are always moving, holes sometimes appear in the Earth's crust. The heat inside the Earth creates a lot of pressure and sometimes the hot magma explodes through the holes. This explosion is called a volcanic
- 15 eruption. The volcano is active.

Parts of a volcano

- Magma: This is the hot liquid inside the volcano.
 It contains rock and gas.
- Magma chamber: This is a large underground pool.
 It contains the magma.
- 20 Pipe: This is in the middle of the volcano. The magma comes out of the magma chamber and travels up the pipe, to the vent.
 - Vent: This is the opening at the top of a volcano. The magma comes out of the vent in the form of lava.
- Lava: This is the magma in an eruption. Lava is extremely hot (700° to 1200°C).
 - Base: This is the bottom of a volcano. Sometimes the base is on the earth's surface, sometimes it is at the bottom of the ocean.
- 30 There are about 1,500 active volcanoes in the world. The largest volcano is Mauna Loa in Hawaii. Its lowest part is at the bottom of the ocean. From the bottom to the top, it is about 8,700 m tall, taller than Mount Everest.







Music makes a difference

July 13th, 1985 was an important day in the history of pop music. It was the date of Live Aid - the first global music event for charity. There were four big concerts in different cities around the world - London, Philadelphia, Moscow and Sydney. The concerts were on television in 160 countries and there were millions of television viewers. The Live Aid concerts were to help people in Africa. In 1985 there was a famine in Ethiopia and thousands of people were hungry. The organizers, two British singers, were friends with a lot of famous pop stars. U2, Queen, Elton John, Madonna, and Bob Dylan were all at the concerts.





Live Aid was a big success and there were millions of donations for Africa – with a total of about \$63 million!

Big charity music events are now common all over the world. On May 17th, 2008, Latin American singers, including Shakira, Ricky Martin and Alejandro Sanz were at two simultaneous concerts in Buenos Aires and Mexico City. The concerts were to help poor children in Latin America and were part of a project called ALAS (Latin America in Solidarity Action). 

THE CREAT FIRE OF CHICAGO

The Great Fire of Chicago began on October 8th, 1871. It started in or near Mrs. O'Leary's barn. The O'Learys were a poor family. Mrs. O'Leary kept cows in a barn and sold their milk to her neighbors. Historians don't know exactly how the fire began, but newspapers at the time said that one of Mrs. O'Leary's cows knocked over a lamp and started the fire.

He's almost 200 years old, but he has the body of a young man. He speaks ten languages and he's an expert in martial arts. He's part human, part animal, and part machine. Who is he? He's Wolverine – one of the world's favorite superheroes.

Readers first saw Wolverine in 1974 in a Marvel comic book. In the beginning, he was a minor character but readers liked him and they wanted more. Wolverine appeared again in the comic book series. These were science fiction stories about a group of mutants with superhuman powers, the X-Men. Wolverine was one of their leaders.
