In South America there are many different ethnic groups. The different ethnic groups have special traditions and customs. They also have their own languages.

There are five million Guaraní people in South America. They are from
Paraguay, Bolivia, Argentina, and Brazil. In Brazil, there are 460,000
Guaraní people. There are three groups of Guaraní in Brazil: Kaoiwá,
Ñandeva, and M'byá. The word Kaoiwá means "forest people". The
Guaraní people live in the forests, but there are problems in the forests
today and life for the Guaraní people isn't easy.

¹⁰ In Bolivia there are thirty-two different ethnic groups and there are many different languages. Two important ethnic groups in Bolivia, and also Peru, are the Quechua people and the Aymara people. The Quechua people are from the Andes and their language is Quechua. The Quechua

- language is from the language of the Incas. The Aymara people are from Lake Titicaca. Lake Titicaca is on the border of Peru and Bolivia. Their language is Aymara. In Bolivia, the Quechua and Aymara languages are official languages as well as Spanish.
- The Matsés or Mayoruna people are from Peru and Brazil. The word Matsés means "people" and the word Mayoruna means "water people". They live on the Javari and Galvez rivers.

The Pirahã people are from Brazil. The Pirahã people are between 10,000 and 40,000 years old, but today there are only 360 people in the Pirahã tribe. Their homes are on the Maici river. Their language is the Pirahã language. When the Pirahã men are in the jungle, they whistle their language.








Architects designs

Oscar Niemeyer is a Brazilian architect from Rio de Janeiro. He is 102 years old! He is a modernist. Modernism is not a modern design movement. It is a design movement from 1872. The shape of buildings is very important in modernist architecture.

Oscar Niemeyer's designs are famous all over the world. His designs include museums, libraries, government buildings, churches, and cathedrals. His buildings are very interesting.

The cathedral in Brasília, the capital city of Brazil, is very famous and it is an important modernist building. The entrance to the cathedral is dark,

- but the big room inside the cathedral is very light. The Oscar Niemeyer museum in Curitiba is like an eye. The museum is in a park and in the museum there are different kinds of art. In Ibirapuera Park in São Paulo, there are some more examples of Niemeyer's work. The Oca is a museum and the design of the Oca is like an ethnic Indian house.

abdomen, chest, neck, and face. Cardiac muscles help your heart to work. Smooth muscles are in your organs: for example in your

stomach. The smooth muscles in your stomach help you to eat.

Muscles and sports

When you play sports you use different muscles. You use muscles in your legs to play soccer and you use muscles in your arms and

legs to play basketball and to dance. These muscles work with your bones to give your body power. Your shoulders have very big muscles called deltoids and your arms have muscles called biceps. These muscles are good for swimming.





Traditional clothes: past to present

Japan

In Japan, the traditional item of clothing is a kimono. It is from the 8th century. The design of a kimono comes from a Chinese style of clothing called *hanfu*. Men, women, and children wear kimonos, but today they only wear a kimono for special

A kimono is one piece of material and people often make them by hand. The different parts of a kimono have different names. The sleeve is the *sode*, the front is the *maemigoro*, and the neck is the *eri*. Kimonos are expensive and often cost more than

¹⁰ \$10,000. People also wear special shoes called *zori* with their kimonos.

Peru

Traditional Quechuan clothes in Peru come from colonial times. The clothes are a combination of two styles: Quechuan clothes before colonial times (pre-1532) and Spanish colonial peasant clothes.

Today people usually wear traditional clothes at special festivals. Women's clothes have many parts. The *lliclla* is a cloth for their shoulders. The *k'eperina* is a large cloth to wear on their backs. They can carry food, fruit, and sometimes even babies in a

k'eperina! The skirts are called *polleras*. Sometimes, women wear three or four skirts, but at a festival a woman can wear fifteen skirts!

There are special hats called *monteras*. Every village has a different hat. All the hats have white beads and they tie under the woman's chin.

There are traditional clothes for men, too. They wear woollen ponchos and hats called *chullos*. Women and men wear shoes called *ojotas*. They are made from recycled car tires and they are very strong.
